Coyote Valley encompasses one of only two critical landscape linkages that allow wildlife movement between the Diablo Range and the Santa Cruz Mountains. It is a critical recharge area for the groundwater basin on which Silicon Valley depends. Its farmland is an important source of healthy, local

food and provides opportunities for the sustained livelihood of the county's farmers and ranchers.

## Sierra Vista: Your New Point of View

### **Open Space Authority Dedicates New Trail and Parking Area**



n August 23, the Open Space Authority hosted hundreds of supporters at its Sierra Vista: Your New Point of View event to celebrate new access to the nearly 2,000 acres of pristine wilderness at Sierra Vista Open Space Preserve and dedicate the new Aquila Loop Trail.

Sierra Vista's popular network of trails were previously accessible only by ascending 1,500 feet through Alum Rock Park. The new parking area on Sierra Road provides direct access to the Upper





and Lower Calaveras Fault Trails that lead into nearly 2,000 acres of open space land and spectacular vistas.

The dedication event featured speakers Senator Jim Beall, California Assembly Speaker pro Tem Nora Campos, Mayors Chuck Reed, San Jose and Jose Esteves, Milpitas, County Supervisor Cindy Chavez, San Jose City Councilmember Ash Kalra, Silicon Valley Chamber of Commerce President Matt Mahood and Janet

# **Local Funding to Protect Open Space**



o continue protecting open space in our community, the Open Space Authority Board of Directors has voted to place a \$24 annual parcel tax measure on the November 2014 ballot. The parcel tax is estimated to generate approximately \$7,883,760 per year. All funds would be spent in the cities of San Jose, Milpitas, Santa Clara, Campbell and Morgan Hill, and the unincorporated portions of Santa Clara County covered by the Open Space Authority, and could not be taken away by the State. The measure would expire in 15 years and could not be renewed without voter approval. For more details about Measure Q, visit openspaceauthority.org.



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t the Family Harvest Feast, be sure to stop by the SAGE (Sustainable Agriculture Education) Local Chili Display, featuring 60 types of chilies, ranging from the mild Aji Dulce to piquante Golden Cayenne to the (almost) lethally hot Trinidad Scorpion. Daring visitors can sample mild and medium-hot chilies as well as chili recipes made by local chefs. The chilies were all grown in the Coyote Valley, as part of a chili pepper research trial conducted by the University of California Cooperative Extension. "This array of chilies from many cultures shows the variety of crops that can be grown here," says Sibella Kraus, director of the Discover Coyote Valley project, which is funding the trial through a Specialty Crops grant from the California Department of Food and Agriculture.
